# **CHAPTER-II**

# **FINANCIAL OUTLAYS & OUTCOME BUDGET 2014-15**

Table 1 gives a summary statement of plan and non-plan allocation in respect of Department of Health and Family Welfare grouping it under the flagship programme NHM and Schemes/ Programmes outside NHM.

Tables 2 highlight the objectives/outcomes, quantifiable deliverables and outlay for 2014-15 under NHM and Non- NHM (Health) respectively. It provides an overview of the critical organizational structure and infrastructure that have been created/ strengthened for preparing the ground to enable the Mission to move towards its objective of accountable and affordable health and more effective healthcare delivery. Wherever possible, a one-to-one correspondence has been attempted between financial and outcome budget as the outcomes cut across different schemes. In respect of the disease control programmes covered under the Mission, the relationship between financial outlay and physical targets has been indicated.
